Cause of Increase or Decrease.

- A. This increase may be generally assigned to a larger (private) consumption by the Army and Navy, and to the larger concourse of persons in the transition from a state of war to one of peace, besides the improved condition of the labouring classes.
- B. A duplicated sum - see Note (A) page 22, and Note (B) page 25.
- C. A casual branch of receipt: - cause of decrease only to be explained by detailing the receipts of the respective years.
- D - E. The total yearly rate of rent as borne at the beginning of the year on the Rent Roll for these two branches was £28,054.10.11, and at the end of the year £28,443.9.11½ - Increase at the rate of £388.19.½ for annum.
- F. £30.5 on wine and spirits and £191.10 for opiating, less £10 decreased on billiard tables and £1 on auctioneers.
- G. The chief cause, a reduced tariff under the new Law Code of Civil Procedure, influencing five months of 1855 and the whole of 1856.
- H. Chief causes - the incorporation of fees under the British Merchant Shipping Act, and a large issue of diplomas from the University.
- I. A similar explanation to the one given in Note C.
- J. Partly by larger hospital reimbursements, partly by £1,700 received for the share of the Naval Department in the expense of constructing a mole, and partly with reference to the explanation given in Note C.
- K. Some improvement in new leases.
- L. Either less poverty, or a less demand for money - or both causes combined.
- M. A similar explanation to the one given in Note C.
- N. The first year's contribution by the Naval Department towards the expense of dredging the harbours, the local Treasury bearing an equal charge.

Cause of Increase or Decrease.

- A. For Salaries £54,703. - So were provided in the general Estimate, and £889.3.4 in Supplemental Estimate - together £55,592.3.8 - Temporary vacancies, sums not provided for, and arrears unsettled are the only explanation that can be given of the unpaid difference of £1481.12.3 $\frac{1}{2}$.
- B. In the greater part accidental, varying according to the exigencies of the Service.
- C. The result of pensions fallen in, new ones granted, former arrears (very large) paid, and current pensions left unpaid. Notwithstanding the large increase shown in the comparison of actual payments, the pension list has been, and continues to be, in the course of gradual reduction in total yearly rate.
- D. Of the £2,500 provided for the dredging service, together with the £2500 referred to in Note N of page 27, £4,966.16.6 $\frac{1}{2}$ have been carried on to be expended in future years - For the revenue services in general, Note B explains the increase in 1856.
- E. A large arrear for consular charges in Alexandria was settled in 1855.
- F. Great sickness in the Year 1855, which also bore an arrear charge on account of the Cholera that prevailed in 1854 -
- G. The Prisons more fully occupied by strangers (in passages) to and from the seat of the late war.
- H. Depending chiefly upon the time of applying to use the appropriations made to works of public utility, whether from the estimated revenues, or from acquired surplus revenue.
- I. Resumed to be chiefly consequent upon a larger collection of revenue.
- J. An overpayment, afterwards recovered - See Note B of page 27 -
- K. The limit is £2000 a year, any unexpended portion of which is reserved for the expense of the Maltese Militia, as far as the same may be required. The reserved balance from this source is £583.17.11 $\frac{1}{4}$.
- L. The payments under this head being made from an acquired fund, specially devoted to the object, the years in which the payments may happen to fall is immaterial in a financial point of view.
