Course of Exchange

Forty-Seven pence half penny per Dollar
of Exchange or Sicilian Dollar.

Forty-Nine pence farthing - per Spanish
pillared Dollar.

Coins.

Gold - none in Circulation.

Silver - by far the greater part Sicilian,
consisting of whole Dollars - Halves
Thirds - Quarters and Sixths -
The remaining part is made up of
Mullese Coins of various denominations.

Spanish Dollars are thrown out as
a circulating medium, by their value,
(at which they are received by Government)
being fixed below what they are worth
in the Market - consequently they are only
to be considered as an Article of Commerce.

Copper - Four - Two - and One Tari pieces -
Ten - Five - and One Grain - piece -
intrinsically worth - on an average
Ninety-Six per Cent less than its
nominal value and inconveniently
abundant.

Amount of Coin in
Circulation.

Supposed about Two Millions of Scudi -
(Spanish Dollars exclusive) - but
fluctuating, the principal Currency being
composed of Foreign Coins - The amount
in Circulation is decreasing.

Amount of Paper
Currency, in cir-

Banks, which amount to about
Sc 200,000. each Bank.
