—	—	—	697	7	11½	<p>The chief cause of the falling off in the collection of the Rents of the Crown Property is the great difficulties which country tenants have labored under during the last three years, in consequence of damages occasioned to their crops by heavy rains & blight. The decrease in the Transfer Duties is owing to the reduction of that on real Property from 2½ to 2 p. C. and the total abolition of that on shipping: the diminution under the head of Miscellaneous Taxes and Dues is caused by fewer Licences having been taken out. The differences in the Customs, Excise, Tonnage, Dues, and Quarantine Dues are chiefly consequent upon new Tariffs published on the 3^d Decemr. 1832, the reduction from the last mentioned source being however partly caused by the smaller number of vessels subjected to quarantine. In the Grain Department larger quantities, with lower Market prices would more than account for the increase, the duties under this head being lower upon the new Tariff. The greater number of personal Bills of Health issued would give a larger increase than is stated in the Fees of the Chief Secretary's Office, but for a small falling off in some of its other receipts. The Auction receipts in 1833 are the same paid by the licensed Auctioneers, while the sum stated for 1832 is the net proceeds of the dues collected by the suppressed Vendue Office after defraying the expense of its establishment. The decrease in the judicial Departments is owing to the transaction of less business in the Courts. The Notarial Duty on Insurances having been totally repealed, the sum brought to account in 1833 is an arrear. The decrease in the receipts for Interest is caused partly by less money advanced for the Grain Concern and partly by a lower rate of Interest. 11	7	3/4				<p>The increase in the Post Office arises from the settlement of various charges abroad. The decrease in the Printing Office, the Treasurer's Office, and the Audit Office, are mainly accounted for by reductions in rate on the Fixed Establishment. That in the Customs partly in the same cause with regard to the Office of Post Fees suppressed early in 1832, and partly by gratuities in that year, not recurring in 1833: in the Excise, there is a reduction in the allowance to the Secretary of the Board of Health: The increase in the Marine Police is occasioned by the whole of the year having borne the charge of hired Labours for clearing the harbours which commenced in April 1832. The decrease in the Land Revenue is from a reduction in a salary on the Fixed Establishment, and the transfer of a pension to the Treasury List. The increase under Public Works is more than accounted for by the repairs of Property on lease, the sum expended on public buildings being much less than in 1832: that in the Excise is caused by the salary of a new gauger: that in the Judicial Departments by the Emoluments of the Attorney General not borne by the whole of 1832, and by £149.7.6. expended for clothing the Police Sergeants and Constables. In the Grain Department a saving appears by the transfer of £214.12. of its establishment, to be charged against the "Government Grain Concern", set off against an increase by the hire of extra Grain Guards in 1833. The saving in the Charitable Institutions is under the heads of Ulms and Maintenance: the increase in the University is from the filling up of a vacancy and the pay of new Professors. The decrease for the Governor's Felicities is owing to repairs and arrears borne by 1832. The increase in Pensions (Civil and Military) and Gratuities arises from £451.12. of the latter, chiefly on account of the suppressed Revenue Office, and from new Pensions: the decrease in Duties is chiefly from charges remaining unsettled: the increase for distressed individuals by the greater number returning from abroad: about 1/2 the increase in Stationery &c: is for the purchase of Law Books for the Code Commission. The particulars of the incidental Expenditure in 1833, are given in page 46. The decrease in the amount remitted to the Agent is because less was required for the service in 1833: and a larger balance remained in the Agent's hands at the close of 1832: and that in Interest by the reduction of rate.</p>
