1224	9	2½				<p>The increase in the Crown Rents is to be assigned rather to the deficiency of the Year 1833 caused by the losses sustained by the Country Tenants from bad crops, than to any permanent improvement in the value of Landed Property. The falling off in the Transfer Duty is accounted for partly by the much larger arrears collected in 1833, and partly by the fewer transfers of landed property taking place in 1834. The improvement in the Customs, the Excise and the Tonnage Dues, arises chiefly from an advanced consumption and business under the new Tariffs operating from the commencement of the two years, and in a small proportion from some of the dues under those Tariffs having been suspended during the first two months of 1833. The increase in the receipts of the Grain Department is more than accounted for by the settlement of arrears, for if all the collections had fallen within their proper years, the comparison would have been against 1834, owing to a lower averaged range of Duties on the graduated scale, and to a lesser importation of grain. — The falling off in the Quarantine dues is consequent upon the state of public health abroad. The amount of interest received from the Grain Department is contingent upon the extent of its Stock in the granaries. All the other differences are to be ascribed generally to accidental causes.</p>

			10	3	3	<p>The decrease in the Post Office is accounted for by a saving of about £70. in the amount of salaries, set against a small increase in the incidental charges. The diminution in the Quarantine Department is contingent upon the smaller amount of its receipts. In the Marine Police there is a reduction of about £100. in the amount of salaries, which gives an increase of upwards of £200. to be accounted for between the stipends of the Office Boats and Lighters, the work of clearing the harbour and the Charge of Oil for the Light House 1833 having been aided by the remains of a supply previously laid in. The decrease in the Works and Repairs is general throughout their several branches. In the Judicial Department there is an advance of about £155. in the charge of maintenance of Prisoners. The increase in the Charitable Institutions consists of £400. 7. 7. in the Alms £175. in the subsidy in aid of the Normal Schools and £359. 18. 8. in the maintenance of Patients and Inmates and the general Contingencies of the Institutions. The increase in the University and Lycæum is accounted for by the new Establishment authorized from home. The subsidy in aid of the Italian Opera has now been withdrawn. The decrease in the Pensions and Gratuities, Civil and Military showing a saving of £308. 3. 11. is to be classed against the Gratuities, £44. 12. having been granted in 1833. to the reduced Clerks of the Suppressed Vendue Office, left about £100. increase in the amount of Pensions, to be accounted for chiefly by some temporary allowances granted to individuals retired from the University. The saving in the Maintenance and passage of distinguished persons arises from fewer having returned from abroad. The charge under the Head of Stationery was increased in 1833 by the cost of Law Books for the Code Commission. The incidental Expenditure of 1834 consists of three Items, namely £225. expenses incidental to the Code Commission, being £124. 13. 7. less than borne by the Year 1833, £45. to a Roman Catholic Chaplain to the Garrison, the same as in 1833, and £1. 12. 3. in a charge incidental to the recovery of an arrear debt. The remittance to the Colonial Agent was less in 1833. in consequence of the amount of money remaining in his hands at the end of 1832. The extent of the Government Loan is regulated by the demand of the Grain Concern. All the other differences which are mostly in the saving side, being each less than £50. do not appear to require any other explanation than that some of the savings are to be accounted for by reductions in the rate of salaries.</p>
