			283	1	5½	<p>Of the decrease in the Crown Rents about £100 is on a Store annexed to the Customs. £50 on buildings transferred to the Ordnance Department, and the remainder may be accounted for by new leases of farms made in 1833 and 1834 operating on the Year 1835. The reduction in the Miscellaneous Taxes and Dues and in the Customs is accounted for under new Tariffs except about £630. less in the collection of the duty on Wine and Spirits. About £1500 of the diminution in the Grain Department is in consequence of the lower range of duty on the graduated Scale, the remainder being accounted for by settlements falling differently within the proper Years. No particular cause can be assigned for the reduction in the receipts for Tonnage Dues. £12½ of the difference in the Chief Secretary's Office is under the head of personal Bills of health, the Fee on which is reduced, and the remainder depends upon accidental causes. The falling off in the Judicial receipts is also casual.</p> <p>The rate of Quarantine Dues has been much reduced under a new Tariff; but the receipt of £297. 17. on account of the expense of discharging a Vessel infected with Plague, and the number of Vessels which performed quarantine here on being expelled from the Sicilian and Neapolitan Ports during the prevalence of Cholera in parts of Italy, have produced a small increase. The advance in the Printing Office is the consequence of increased occupation and of an extended sale of the Gazette.</p> <p>The other small differences are to be ascribed to accidental causes.</p>

			23	19	6.	In the Chief Secretary's Office there has been an increase at the rate of £71.8. a Year, beginning in May, on uniting with the duties of First Assistant in that Office those of Clerk to the Council.
35	19	1 $\frac{1}{4}$	42	7	8 $\frac{1}{2}$	The consolidation of the Excise with the Custom has effected a permanent saving at the annual rate of £217.6.; but an increase appears 1 <sup>st</sup> that such saving operates on only a portion of the Year; and 2 <sup>d</sup> that a charge of £100.3. has been incurred in gratuities to discharged Seigniors. — The expense of the Quarantine Department is contingent on the extent of business, but it has been particularly increased in 1835, by a charge of £346.2.7 (of which £297.17. is reimbursed) for deputation of a Vessel infected with the Plague. — The payment of £164.7.3 $\frac{1}{2}$ in settlement of a claim of a remittance on the Land Revenue Department is the reason that a small saving does not appear under this head. — The increase which appears in the Marine Police and Department of Works, that is to say when viewed with reference to the amounts stated against notes a and b, arises from a portion of the expense having been specially defrayed from the savings of previous years. — In the Judicial Departments there is a saving at the annual rate of £240.1. affecting the whole Year in the arrangements made on the death of the First Magistrate of Justice and the remaining difference is nearly accounted for by £109.3. in arrear for the pay of a Judge. — The Charitable Institutions bear an increase of £208.15.2 $\frac{1}{2}$ under the head of Alms (still within the authorized limits of £4000) and £58. in the subsidy to the Normal Schools from an arrangement commencing from a broken period of 1834; and the remainder of the increase is generally under the head of Maintenance of the Hospitals and Asylums. — The decrease in the Civil Pensions is principally caused by 1834, having borne for a time the retired allowances of Professors from the University by the real annual rate of reduction in 1835 being only £36. — The Burthens were heavier in 1834, from that Year having borne about £100 more arrears than defrayed in 1835. — The increase for the maintenance & passage of distressed persons is altogether casual. — The annual rate of increase on the Military Pension List is £12. — The extent of the Government Loan is regulated by the demands of the Grain Concern. —
