449	14	6 $\frac{1}{2}$				<p>The increase from the Landed Property arises from a more efficient collection as the amount of rental falling due within the year is not improved, but on the contrary about £120, less than in 1835. The reduction in the Miscellaneous Taxes and Dues, the Customs and Quarantine Dues, are chiefly owing to the New Tariffs established in 1835, part of which year had the benefit of the old ones; nevertheless, there is a real falling off on some of the articles of import, the duties on which remained unaltered; besides that the receipts of the Quarantine were extended in 1835, by money recovered for the expense of deparating an infected vessel. The advance in the Grain Department is owing to the duty having been higher on the graduated scale during their months of 1836. The declension in the Tonnage Dues is entirely accidental: so likewise is the net increase in the Judicial Fees. The diminution in the amount of Interest on Capital advanced to the Grain Department (3 per Cent) is nearly accounted for by £11,045. 15. 6. Capital written off from the debt of that Department in adjustment of the accounts of the Government Grain Concern for 11 Years, ended with 1835 - The other articles either explain themselves, or show differences not to a sufficient amount to call for particular remark, such differences, however have arisen chiefly from accidental causes.</p>

—	—	—	540	13	3 $\frac{1}{2}$	<p>On the Governor's Establishment £541.13.4$\frac{1}{2}$ remained undrawn in 1836 during a vacancy in that Office. In the Chief Secretary's Office £23.16 is accounted for by an increase on the establishment operating from 15 May 1835, and the remainder is extra remuneration and other incidental charges. The Customs in 1835, bore an extra charge of £108.3. in gratiities to reduced emigrants, add to which the Marine establishment during the early months of the year, while the same remained a separate branch. The expenses of the Quarantine in 1835 was increased by the charge of detaching an infected vessel. The decrease under the Marine Branch (see Note A) arises chiefly from a limitation in the expenses of special works for the improvement of the Great Harbour. The Land Revenue in the same year had to settle an arrear claim of £164.7.3$\frac{1}{2}$. The net expenditure under the head of Public Works and Repairs (see Note B) would have been much greater, but for the heavy outlay in the repair of buildings in lease indispensable for the maintenance of the arsenal. In the Judicial Department £107.3 were paid in 1836 for a salary of 1835 amounting for double the amount in the comparison besides £50 for a gratuity paid in 1836, as an arrear of 1835; which show a general saving in the other judicial services. The increase in the Charitable Institutions arises from extended relief to the poor by means of Alms, treatment in Hospital and reception into the Asylums. A subsidiary aid to the separate Funds of the University and Lycæum amounts for £105, of the increase under this head. The Pensions (Civil and Military) by the end of the year are reduced in actual annual rate by £65.7. and the Burthens in such rate by £30.2.9. The increase in the expenses of Stationery is chiefly in consequence of the demands of the several Commissions now sitting. The increase in the commitments to the Colonial Agent General, if viewed conjointly with the commitments, will be found reduced to £890. This difference will be best explained by a reference to his accounts, it being here merely observed that he started for the year 1836, credits in a balance of £217.19.4, and has reported £255.17.5, as advanced to the 1843 Commission of Enquiry, besides £118.1.2 disbursed for the service of the Order of St. Michael and St. George. For the Commission for revising the Laws of Malta the year 1835, bore an arrear charge of £308.10.9. The incidental articles which do not come into particular comparison are those of £110.17.5. £2300, £20. £460.3.1. £199.15.4, and £330. detailed in page 34, besides an arrear of £23 paid in settlement of a claim of the Monte di Pietà. The other differences either explain themselves or are of an inferior amount to explain which in this place would lead to too much detail.</p>
