17,419	18	1				<p>In consequence of the same receipts for the Fourth Quarter of the Year 1840, being included in both columns, the comparison can only rest between the first 9 months of the one column and the last nine months of the other.</p> <p>No alteration having taken place in the laws affecting the sources of revenue, the large increase in the import duties & other branches dependent upon trade or intercourse has been caused partly by an extended resort of shipping & passengers, and partly by a failure of the native harvest from the late unusual drought, which has led to a larger importation of grain and a consequent increase of import duty. The same cause has rendered the cultivators of land unable to pay their full rents, and accounts for the diminished receipts of the Land Revenue. All other differences depend upon accidental or general causes.</p> <p>In respect to the total increase it should be borne in mind that 1840 was a year of very low receipt.</p>

			16	19	8	<p>The identical payments made within the last quarter of the Year 1840 being included in both columns, no just comparison of yearly expense can be drawn in this place: the principal causes of difference will therefore alone be noticed. In August 1840, a special remittance of £ 3000 was made to the London Agent towards the cost and charges of a Steam engine with other machinery to be employed in clearing the harbours; and thus far in 1841 somewhat more than the like amount has been paid by the Land Revenue for building a barge to receive that machinery; added to about £ 4300, expended in works undertaken and measures adopted for supplying water to the inhabitants and shipping during the past long-continued drought; which extended over the period of this Statement. The decrease in the Customs and a portion of the increase in the Marine Police and Quarantine are caused by a transfer of part of the establishment in the summer of 1840, besides which the Quarantine charges have been further augmented by increased business, bringing with it a compensation on the side of revenue. A great prevalence of sickness has swelled the expenditure of the Charitable Institutions. The Pension List has been in a gradual course of diminutions. In 1840, the unusually low produce of the revenue left no funds for payment of the annual subsidy of £ 5000 in aid of the military service which has been paid for account of and within the Year 1841, added to £ 1200, in payment of the first year's indemnity, falling due in March 1841, for the coast guard furnished by the Fencible Regiment: the arrear of £ 5000 for the Year 1840 remains due until a sufficient accumulation of funds shall admit of its payment.</p>
