			1229	2	6.	<p>The net collections of revenue, although somewhat less than in 1841, have greatly exceeded the expectation formed from the previous average of receipt. The amount of import duties during the last two years has been increased by the extended importation of articles of consumption, required as well to make good the deficiency of the native harvest from the drought of 1840-1841, as to supply the demands consequent upon the continued presence of a large naval force in the harbour, - and the net receipts in 1842, chiefly from these two temporary causes, may be said to have exceeded by about £12,000 the ordinary annual wants of the Island.</p> <p>From the first mentioned cause the collections of landed rents have suffered though less in the second year in which they were still about £1700 below the rate of the rent-roll. A portion of this deficiency will however be recoverable to the benefit of the account for the year 1843.</p> <p>All other differences can only be assigned to incidental causes.</p>

			89	2	$\frac{1}{4}$	<p>Confining the explanation to the items of difference under £100, the first that comes to notice is the Pensions. These are gradually undergoing a decrease; but part of the stated saving arises from a retrospective adjustment made on the account for the pension payable through the Agent in London.</p> <p>An increase appears in the Ordinary Contingencies only from circumstances having admitted a larger saving in 1841, for which year £2070 was originally estimated, and for 1842 £2085.</p> <p>No particular cause can be assigned for the net reduction of about £300 in the repairs of property, as these depend upon the state of delapidation varying from year to year.</p> <p>In 1841, the work of clearing the harbours was in a great measure stopped, pending the building and outfit of a new dredging barge with Steam apparatus, and which is still unfinished;— but in 1842 a branch of work not dependent upon the dredging apparatus was effected out of the sum provided for the service.</p> <p>The clothing of the Police is a limited annual expense; but which shows a difference according to the years in which the articles furnished are paid for.</p> <p>The net saving of more than £400 in the Charities is dependent upon general causes.</p> <p>Among the Extraordinary Contingencies—a class not of a nature to come into a comparison of details—the chief to be referred to are— Works and Services for the supply of water in consequence of the drought, £5840 in 1841, against £1017 in 1842;— Cost and outfit of the Steam dredging barge £3900 in 1841 against £535 in 1842;— and extraordinary repairs of Streets and roads £853 in 1841 against £3054 in 1842.</p>
