The one, the incorporation of various separate funds, within their attendant expenditure, which were separately accounted for in 1848; the other, the change in the system of bringing monthly expenditure to account, causing only eleven months service to fall for payment within the year 1849. Some of the branches are affected by the causes; others not.</p> <p>For the rest, material reductions in contingent and current expenses have been effected through economy; and, after allowing for services remaining to be defrayed out of the provision already made, a saving of £4838. 2. 5$\frac{1}{4}$ has resulted on the total expenditure as compared with the Estimate—a comparison more just than the one with the previous year's expense; the Estimates of provision being regulated by the revenue at disposal, whether prospectively, or in realized surplus.</p> <p>Of this saving, £940. 12. $-\frac{2}{4}$ go against salaries and allowances, £252. 13. 3. against office contingencies, and the remainder is to be distributed generally between the services numbered 3. 4. 5. 6. 7. 8. 9. 10. 11. 13. 14. and 15, with the net result of the five remaining sums.</p> <p>The share of the above saving falling to the charitable services N^{os} 6. and 8 is £2516. 14. 2$\frac{1}{4}$.</p>
