H This difference is chiefly in dividends on further investments in 3% Consols.

STATEMENT OF THE EXPENDITURE, OF 1875.

Instructions of 1847.

Expenditure, General Causes of Increase or Decrease, above £ 100

**A** This difference is consequent on the Increase of the Police Force in order to furnish Coast Guards.

**B** The number of Health Guards in 1875 was much less than in 1874.

**C** The annual rate of pensions granted in 1875 amounts to £ 388 18 5 ; that of pensions lapsed in 1875 amounts to £ 212 8 2.

From 1st April 1875 all military pensions ceased to be payable by the local Government. Pensions on the partial reduction of the R. M. F. Artillery in 1873, paid up to March 1875, were charged against one fourth of the provision (£ 5000) for Military Contribution, remitted for 1875 by the Imperial Government. See **K**.

**D** This difference is caused chiefly by expenses incurred for carrying out Ordinance VII of 1869.

**E** This increase is chiefly on the item for the relief and passage home of distressed Maltese.

**G** This increase is chiefly in Police clothing and bedding having reference to Coast Guard services now performed by the Police.

**H** These differences depend simply on the services undertaken and their cost. The sums revoted for 1876 were, Works and Buildings £ 7,715 0 9 ; Roads &c. £ 1,317 16 3.

**I** This difference is caused chiefly by expenses incurred for the prevention of Cattle disease.

**K** In 1874 the contribution of £ 1,200 for Revenue and Coast Guard purposes ceased, and the £ 5,000 contribution for Military purposes for that year was remitted, and Coast Guard expenses and pensions awarded to the men of the R. M. F. Artillery on the reduction of the regiment in 1873 were charged under that Head of service. See **C**.

**L** This service depends upon the special requirements of each year—and fluctuates accordingly.
