Revenue, General Causes of Increases or Decreases, above £ 100.

A This decrease is caused by considerable fluctuations in the various receipts under certain items, such as Wheat &c. which gave a loss of £ 8,179 7 3 against an increase of £ 2,939 7 8 on Saggina, &c.

B Increase attributable to there being quarantine during the year

C This decrease is attributable to the recovery in 1880 of the greater part of the outstanding arrears of former years.

STATEMENT OF THE EXPENDITURE OF 1881.

Expenditure, General Causes of Increases or Decreases, above £ 100.

- A) This decrease on the Fixed and increase on the Provisional Establishments is attributable to the
 B) reduced number of Clerks in the Fixed and the consequent employment of Extra Assistance payable on the Provisional List.
- C This decrease is attributable to the discontinuation of the allowances for transport of several public officers.
- D The annual rate of pensions granted in 1881 amounted to £ 1,980 3 2; that of pensions lapsed in 1881 amounted to £ 2,095 19 7.
 From 1st April 1875 all military pensions ceased to be payable by the local Government.
- E This excess is attributable to the expense (£ 1,000) incurred for dredging the Harbour Extension; for dredging a canal in front of a site given in lease as a coal yard under the Corradino Hill £ 50; and the construction of four boats for the Port Department 1880.
- F This decrease is attributable to the vote for accoutrements for the Police not being wholly availed of in 1881.
- G This increase is attributable to the expenses consequent on the allowances for transport to several public officers having been discontinued and charged under this head of service.
- H This increase is chiefly attributable to the expense for subsidies for mail steamers which are partly reimbursed by contribution from the Imperial Government.
- I These differences depend simply on the services undertaken and their cost. The sums revoted for 1882 are: Works and Buildings £ 5,934 1 3; Roads, Streets and Bridges £ 213 13 2.
- K This increase is chiefly attributable to the expense incurred for covering defalcation in the Monte Saving's Bank at Gozo and for taking a Census for the last 10 years.
- L This difference is chiefly attributable to the payment of arrears of interest on ancient loans.
- M These services depend upon the special requirements of each year, and fluctuate accordingly.
- N This increase is attributable to the expenses consequent on the election of members of Council during 1881.
- O The total increase was £ 18,721 18 9½.

The following is a statement of the Commissioners of the Land Office, in relation to the land owned by the State of New York, and the same is published for the information of the people.
