OF THE REVENUE OF 1887.

Revenue, General Causes of Increase or Decrease, above £ 100.

- A.** This increase is due to greater importation of Bullocks, Wheat, and Inferior Wine. The average receipt of the last 3 years, 1885-6-7, was £ 141,254.
- B.** This source of revenue is of an eventful nature; the amount collected less than that of last year is due to the imposition of sfratto against infected Ports, which diminished the arrivals of Vessels and passengers in these Ports.
- C.** This decrease is due to the payments in 1886, of certain fixed annuities payable triennially.
- D.** This increase is due to amounts received on the new system of supplying water.
- E.** This difference is due to a more limited sale of stamps and share on Parcels.
- F.** This difference is due to the collection in 1886 of fees on Academical degrees and to a smaller amount of fees received in 1887 on shipping transactions owing to cholera.
- G.** This increase is due to the refund of cost of the maintenance of the Offices of the Monte di Pietà and Savings Bank, brought into separate accounts in this year.
- H.** The amount of interest received by the Crown Agents on account of investments was £ 11,672 0 8; of this amount £ 9,071 6 1 were passed to credit of Savings Bank, and the remainder, £ 2,600 14 7, to credit of General Revenue. The Profits of the Savings Bank, and of the Monte di Pietà for 1887 (£ 5,249 13 11 $\frac{3}{4}$) have been passed to Revenue in 1888.
- I.** This difference is chiefly due to a sum of £ 82 9 4 having remained uncollected at the end of 1887.
- J.** Decrease £ 4,565 2 1.

Expenditure, General Causes of Increase or Decrease, above £ 100.

- A.** This difference is due to the suppression of 30 temporary Constables, and to a large supply in 1886 of clothing materials for Police uniforms.
- B.** This difference is due to an expenditure incurred in 1886 for the supply of printing materials.
- C.** This decrease is attributable to the payment in 1886 of a sum unpaid in the previous year for conveyance of mails.
- D.** This service depends on the special requirements of each year, and fluctuates accordingly.
- E.** This difference is chiefly due to increased expenses for the maintenance of prisoners abroad, for summoning and other expenses of witnesses and jurors, and for inquests.
- F.** This decrease is attributable to a low expenditure on provisions.
- G.** This increase is chiefly due to a larger expenditure for clothing and bedding, and for drugs.
- H.** The expenses of maintenance of the Monte di Pietà are now defrayed out of Revenue from property belonging to the Monte, and of interest received on sums advanced on pawns: That of the Savings Bank out of Dividends on a sum invested in the 3 % Consols.
- I.** Increase due to several new grants of pensions.
- J & K.** This decrease is due to the limited number of works carried out in 1887.
- L.** This difference is chiefly due to rent paid for apartments in the Monte di Pietà used as office of Charitable Institutions.
- M.** Decrease of expenditure by the Departments of Police, Public Works, and Charitable Institutions.
- N.** This increase is due to expense incurred in connection with the visitation of Cholera (13,025 9 3).
