OF THE REVENUE OF 1890.

Revenue, General Causes of Increase or Decrease, above £ 100.

- A.** This increase is chiefly due to less consumption of grains, wines and spirits.
- B.** This source of revenue is of a fluctuating nature, the amount collected in 1890 is chiefly due to quarantine imposed on cattle imported from abroad.
- C.** This decrease is attributable to the reduction of the rent of several lands, owing to general depreciation of rural property.
- D.** This increase is due to the rising of the rents of several Government urban tenements.
- E.** This decrease is chiefly due to the reduction of the fees for licences for retailing wines and spirits.
- F.** This increase is chiefly due to an increased sale of stamps.
- G.** This increase is chiefly due to larger sums collected under fees, by the Superior Courts.
- H.** Increase due to a larger amount collected on fees for inspecting slaughtered animals, and for Abattoir fees.
- I.** This increase is due to the transfer of the interest of the Dollar Investment Fund, for which a vote under Expenditure has now been taken.
- J.** This increase is attributable to further investments on British and Colonial Securities during 1890.
- K.** This increase is chiefly due to a larger consumption of water.
- L.** Increase £ 10,078 11 0 $\frac{1}{2}$.

OF THE EXPENDITURE OF 1890.

Expenditure, General Causes of Increase or Decrease, above £ 100

- A.** This increase is chiefly due to the Reorganization of the Staff of the Police Department.
- B.** This increase is attributable to a greater amount expended for postages and telegrams, printing materials, expenses for advertisements for tenders and expenses of the Public Works for drawing implements.
- C.** The increase is chiefly due to higher outlay for working the Dredge.
- D.** This decrease is due to higher expenses for elections in 1889.
- E.** This increase is chiefly attributable to further requirements of articles of bedding and furniture for the Police Stations, consequent on the reorganization of the Police Force.
- F.** The decrease is chiefly due to the fact that the expenses for the training in England of Assistant Teachers were not incurred during this year.
- G.** This increase is due to higher outlay for provisions, drugs and Surgical Instruments for the Charitable Institutions.
- H.** The decrease is chiefly due to the death of several pensioners of superior rank.
- I & J.** This increase is due to the large number of new works carried out in 1890.
- K.** This increase is chiefly due to the raising of rent of several tenements held on lease by the Government for the use of the Police Stations, Dispensaries and Schools.
- L.** This increase is chiefly attributable to the addition of several new items of Expenditure viz: Interest payable to the Savings Bank recoupable, by the refund of its profit — Interest payable to the Depositors of the Dollar Investment Fund, recoupable by Dividends, and interest paid to the Administrators of the Pappaffy Fund, recoupable by Dividends.
- M.** This increase is chiefly due to larger refunds to the Army and Navy of duties on articles supplied thereto.
- N.** Increase of expenditure by the Works Department and Charitable Institutions, and Corradino Prison.
- O.** This increase is chiefly due to the expenses for improving the sanitation of towns and villages, expenses for the slaughter-houses, recoupable by fees, and for cattle disease.

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
