17, 13 in the Wards, and 4 in the Airing Courts, the former are provided with cross ventilated anterooms and with earthenware troughs flushed automatically and periodically, the latter have Crown basins with waste water preventors.

A main Sewer along and outside the building receives branches from all the latrines, bath rooms, sculleries and wash houses, and discharges its contents on the grounds at a distance from the Asylum. The whole system is provided with ventilating shafts and has an automatic and periodical flushing, and the sewage is used for irrigation.






CENTRAL HOSPITAL.


UPPER FLOOR




ENTRANCE FOR AMBULANCE, MUSICAL, DRILLS,

MILITARY PARADE GROUND.






