A natural spring at a distance from the Asylum; the quality is good, and the quantity available for each patient every day is between 20 and 25 gallons for all services. Water for drinking is supplied under pressure from the aqueduct.

The troughs are provided with ventilating shafts and are flushed periodically and automatically. Those in the yards have Crown basins and are flushed periodically.

What is the system of Sewerage?

A main sewer along and outside the building receives branches from all the latrines, bath rooms, skulleries and wash houses, and discharges its contents on the grounds at a distance from the Asylum. The whole system is provided with ventilating shafts and has an automatic and periodical flushing, and the sewage is used for irrigation.

† A small building in Central Yard is supplied with all necessary hydropneumatic appliances for constant purposes.

What is the system of Sewerage?

The potable water is conveyed from a natural spring to a storage reservoir at about $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the town and then by an iron main. The second quality water is conveyed by an iron main from a natural hard spring at about two miles from the town, and then pumped to the same. Any quantity is available, as the building is directly connected with the aqueducts.

Two sets of lavatories (earthenware basins fixed on marble slabs) one in each division.

Two. Porcelain.

Two Latrines. Six Crown basins with waste water preventors. (Three in each division).

Water system. The privies are separated from the Wards by ventilated anterooms.

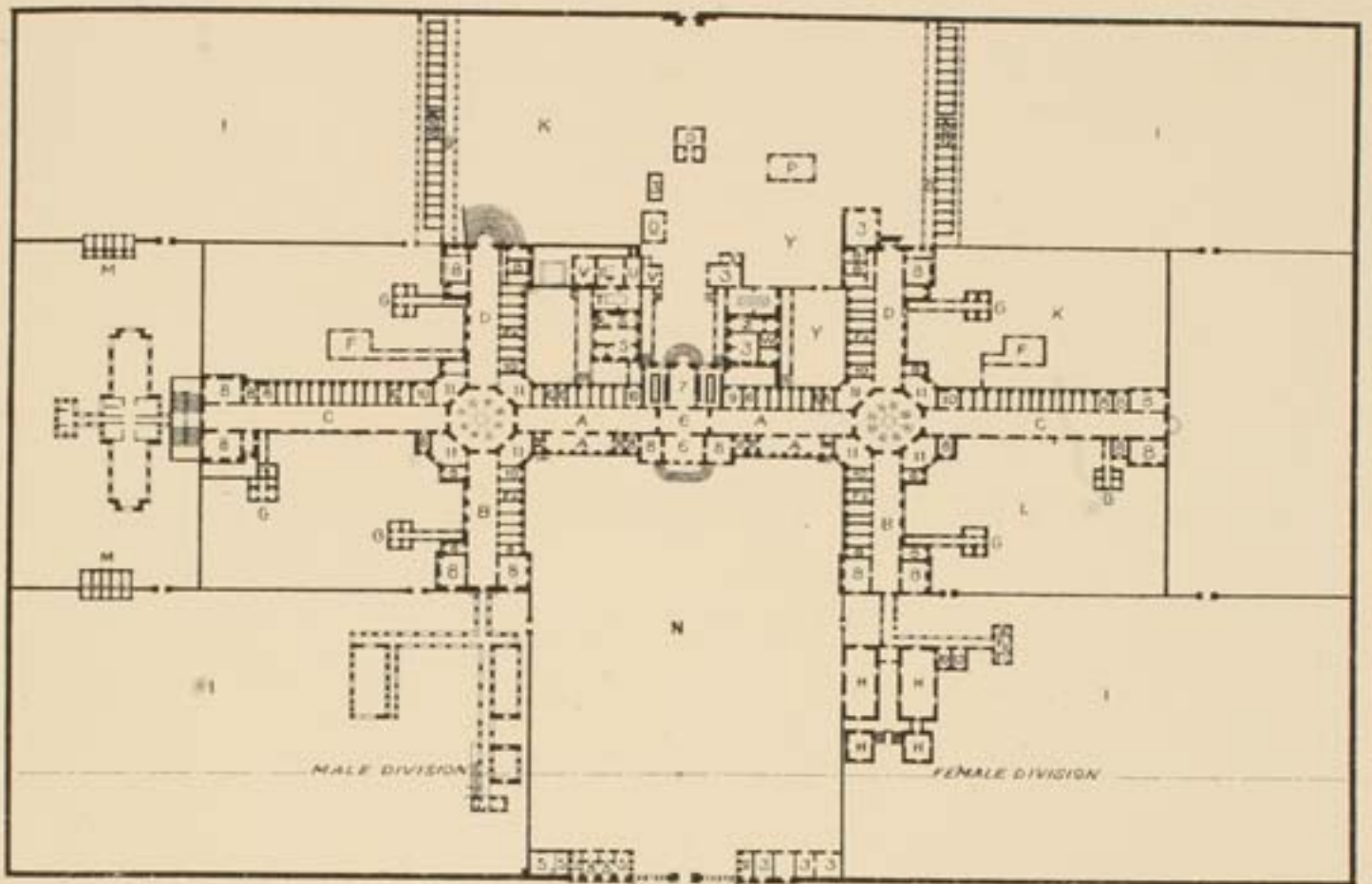
